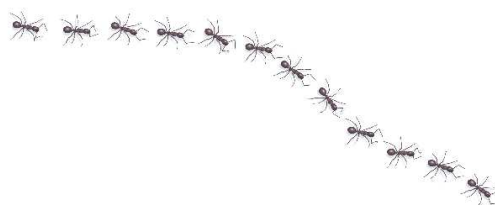


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TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL PEST CONTROL TREATMENTS

1. Please advise us of any family/staff/pet allergies or of any other health concerns that you may have regarding your pest treatment.
2. The product is generally safe when all areas are dry and any odor has dissipated.
3. For Flea/Tick Treatments - Be prepared to vacate the property for up to two hours. If you are chemically sensitive to the products we advise that you avoid contact with damp areas until dry. Also wear footwear until all areas have dried completely. Refer to Flea information on following page.
4. Dogs should be restrained during the treatment for the Technician's safety.
Cats should be secured away from the house.
Birds should be covered and placed well away from treatment areas.
All fish (reptile) tanks or ponds should be covered or removed during treatment.
5. Do not mop or vacuum the internal floors for 48 hours.
6. Do not wash the exterior of the house for two weeks, and then remove all webs and ensure that the house is washed down at least once before year's end. **NB.** Spiders ride on the wind and chemicals cannot destroy egg sacs. They will re-emerge and need to be washed off regularly.
7. Try to keep all food in your pantry in sealed containers.
8. Keep gutters clean as leaf clutter will induce redback and cockroach breeding.

9. Keep pet feeding areas clean as cockroaches have a craving for pet food.
10. Preventative maintenance in your yard will help stop infestation of ants. If you do not stop an ant nest in your yard you will not stop infestation of your house.
11. We recommend that washing be removed from the line but not essential if not in close proximity to treatment areas.
12. You may wish to remove your car from the garage or carport so there is no residue remaining on your vehicles.
13. Please observe any verbal advice given by your licensed technician.

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REDBACK SPIDERS – HELPFUL HINTS

Redback spiders may be inhabiting your property.

- With a little bit of help and vigilance on your behalf, you can help reduce the risk of this dangerous pest in and around your property.
- We recommend all of our customers carry out a thorough cob webbing of all treated areas approximately two weeks after a treatment for spiders has been carried out. We recommend that you dispose of webs in your garbage and not in the garden.
- Interrupting the life cycle by removing webbing materials and egg sacs is vital, as egg sacs may remain viable after a treatment and may then hatch and reinfest the property.
- **Remember: regular checks under outdoor furniture, pot plants and children's toys may help reduce the risk.**
- Make a note of where you find any live redbacks and make sure you let your pest technician know.



FLEA CONTROL – HELPFUL HINTS

- Treat your pets as soon as you can. You will get better results if all flea treatments – environmental and on animal are done around the same time.
- **DO NOT AVOID FLEA INFESTED AREAS AFTER THE TREATMENT – YOU WILL REDUCE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE TREATMENT.** Especially remember the spare room, shed or places where pets like to rest.
- If you remove the pet flea problems may appear to be worse – as you become the only potential host.
- It is best to treat before the numbers build up. There is no need to go through the discomfort of flea bites.
- Entering vacant houses will stimulate any fleas waiting to hatch. This is especially a problem with vacant rental and holiday houses.
- If you are going on holidays, have a friend stomp through the house/yard several times while you are away, especially on the day of your return – the fleas will hatch and die on the treated surfaces before you return.
- Please **DO NOT** use **LIME** to control fleas, this will neutralize our product and void any warranties.
